Anthea Roberts is a Lecturer in Law, teaching Public International Law, International Dispute Resolution and Investment Treaty Law. Anthea joined the London School of Economics in 2008 and is one of the co-founders of LSE's [Transnational Law Project](#). For the school year of 2011-2012, she is a Visiting Professor at Harvard Law School. Her field of expertise is public international law with a particular focus on international dispute resolution, investment treaty law, international law before national courts and the sources of international law.

Anthea graduated from the Australian National University with a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Laws with First Class Honours and a University Medal. She completed a Master of Laws in International Legal Studies at New York University on a Fulbright Scholarship and a Hauser Scholarship.

Anthea served as an Associate to the Chief Justice of the High Court of Australia, the Hon. A.M. Gleeson AC, and as an intern for the Hon. Judge Simma at the International Court of Justice, before spending five years as an attorney in the International Dispute Resolution Group at Debevoise & Plimpton LLP in New York and London.

Anthea was awarded the 2011 Francis Deák Prize by the American Society of International Law for her article ['Power and Persuasion in Investment Treaty Interpretation: The Dual Role of States'](#) 104 *AJIL* 179 (2010) and the 2002 Francis Deák Prize for her article ['Traditional and Modern Approaches to Customary International Law'](#) 95 *AJIL* 757 (2001).

Anthea has served as a member of the Executive Council of the American Society of International Law, as Co-Chair of the ASIL Annual Meeting and as the Rapporteur for the International Bar Association's Task Force on Extraterritorial Jurisdiction.
